NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

This week you would have noticed the school bell linking in with Reconciliation Week. The theme for National Reconciliation Week 2023 is Be a Voice for Generations. The theme encourages all Australians to be a **voice for reconciliation** in tangible ways in our everyday lives – where we live, work, and socialise. For the work of generations past, and the benefit of generations future, act today for a more just, equitable and reconciled country for all.

National Reconciliation Week - 27 May to 3 June - is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements and to explore how each of us

can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

We live in faith that all people will rise from the depths of despair and hopelessness. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families have endured the pain and loss of loved ones, through the separation of children and their families.

COVID -19



Holy Week

Over the past week, we have reflected as a Catholic community, on Jesus` life and death as we prepare ourselves for the joy of the Resurrection at Easter. Students have engaged in a variety of activities and prayer rituals to learn about the significance of the week leading up to Easter, known as Holy Week.

Holy Week is a time of special meaning. It is a week during which we do things that we don't usually do and hear things that we don't usually hear. Holy Week has been held in great reverence since the very early years of the Church and no other Christian observance has interested the world so much.

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday and comprises the seven days before Easter. The last three days of Holy Week, link together Lent and Easter, they are called the Triduum (meaning three days). They are Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. The Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday begins the new season of Easter.)

On the first Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem with a triumphal welcome in the week before the traditional Jewish feast of the Passover. Jewish crowds who were there for the feast days waved palm branches (a custom of the time used to welcome visiting kings) and cheered Jesus' arrival on a donkey.

The Easter Triduum begins with Mass on Holy Thursday evening, when Jesus sacramentally anticipated the gift, he would make of himself on the cross. His command to serve others is dramatically recalled this night in the ceremony of the washing of the feet, which he performed for his disciples.

The Good Friday rites centre on the reading of the Passion of Jesus. According to ancient tradition, an image or relic of the cross is venerated this day, and the sacrament of Christ's love for his church is received. It is a day of fasting and quiet mourning.

The Easter Vigil is the high point of the Easter Triduum celebrating the passion and resurrection of Jesus.



Easter Mass

Yesterday, we gathered for a wonderful Easter Mass. Our theme for the Mass was, Jesus is alive. We were reminded that during this time we must let Jesus reignite our hope as we exercise humility and selflessness.

Thank you to our Year 6 classes for preparing this Easter celebration. Thank you to Father Kym for leading in Mass and to all the families who joined us in prayer.



Physical Education

First Nations Peoples Histories and Cultures: An Exploration of Traditional Games in Physical Education - Scott Hughes


Many of the games and sports you see today have evolved from traditional games of the past. Over the years, these games and sports have played a major role in developing a socially-cohesive environment within First Nations communities.

From Week 8 to Week 11, students from Years 3 to 6 have been participating in physical activities and cultural practices such as traditional and contemporary First Nations games. To date, we have played games from Kaurna Country, Ngarrindjeri Country, Dhirari Country, Kabi Kabi Country, Noongar Country, and Pitjantjatjara Country. Through these games, students are developing greater understanding and appreciation of First Nations cultures — the way it was many thousands of years ago and still is today.

Our lessons have been underpinned by a conceptual framework which comprises the underlying elements of Identity and Living Communities and the key concepts of Country, Culture and People. Each lesson, we begin by acknowledging the game's Country of origin and pinpoint its location on a map of Indigenous Australia. During game play, we use the language of the Country (for example, during the game of Diyari Koolchee, we use the term 'koolchee', rather than ball, when referring to the objects being thrown), and at the end of the lesson we discuss the significant impact that the games played have had on a local, national, and global scale.

Students are also learning about Aboriginal processes and 'ways of knowing'. In Week 8, students used two Aboriginal pedagogies: Story Sharing (through yarning circles) and Deconstruct-Reconstruct, with the intention of adding rules to the Kaurna game of Parndo and the Kabi Kabi game of Buroinjin to establish new ways to play the games. This opportunity serves to teach students about the richness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander modes of communication, extending our learning beyond game play.

Enrolments Update

Dear parents.

Thank you for your kind welcome to the SFX School community this Term. I have appreciated your patience and understanding whilst navigating the enrolments and processes at SFX. Please read below a little update about Enrolments and Curious Xavier's.

I will be on leave until the end of Week 2 of Term 2. For any urgent enquiries please send an email to PA@sfx.catholic.edu.au and Leila will respond to you in due course.

SFX Enrolment process update.

We have recently reviewed and updated the Enrolment process at SFX. To keep in line with changing expectations of busy families we have tried to forward plan to streamline our enrolment process, meaning that there is opportunity for families to finalise the enrolment in a timely manner and there will be no requirement for extra interviews unless families would like to. The aim of this is so families can complete the enrolment process and receive confirmation of enrolment earlier, giving them the security of knowing their child is enrolled at a young age and allowing them to make future plans for kindergarten/preschool enrolments.

All enrolment applicants

The only way to commence the enrolment process for your child is to lodge an Enrolment Application with a copy of your child's Birth Certificate and pay the \$50.00 application lodgement fee to the office. After this the process is: -

Siblings of current families - a letter of acceptance will be issued; families can choose whether they would like to meet with our Deputy Principal about their child's education.

New Families who have attended a Group Tour - a letter of acceptance will be issued; families can choose whether they feel they require a follow up interview.

Private tours - after a private tour, a letter of acceptance will be issued.

Securing your child's place at SFX

To secure your child's enrolment you will need to return the signed Enrolment Acceptance together with the \$100.00 Acceptance Fee payment to the school office. (The \$100 will be credited to the first school fees due and is non-refundable if you change your mind about enrolment).

For students with medical / learning needs

Families will be required to disclose the information and meet with Leadership in order for the school to tailor a transition and learning program specific to your child's needs.

Curious Xavier's Transition Program (CX)

This is an optional Reception Transition Program which runs on a Friday, 6 months prior to your child's commencement in Reception and is offered to all families who have completed the enrolment process. It is a requirement that all students enrolled in CX are Immunised and copy of the Immunisation Certificate must accompany the CX enrolment application.

We understand that some families may not be able to enrol their child in CX due to work or family's commitments. In addition to CX, a compulsory Transition Program for all families will consist of a Parent Information Session and two Transition mornings for the children at the end of the Term preceding their child's commencement.

New enrolments during the school year for Reception - Year 6

Families will be required to attend for an interview with the principal and upon receipt of the Enrolment application, \$50 lodgement fee, copy of birth certificate and previous school/medical/inclusive education reports, Leadership will consider offering a place if there is a vacancy in the particular year level/s required.

Enrolments for Reception in Term 3, 2023

We are still waiting on a few families to complete the enrolment process. Families who have not yet completed the enrolment process have been contacted for prompt action.

A compulsory parent Information evening and two transition mornings for students will be offered in late Term 2. Information will be sent home soon.

Enrolments for Reception in Term 1, 2024

Families who have completed the enrolment process for Reception in Term 1, 2024 were forwarded an email relating to Curious Xavier's enrolment earlier this term. CX Enrolment applications and payments are required by 12 May. Confirmations of enrolment in CX will be emailed to families by the end of week 4 in Term 2.

If you have enrolled your child for Term 1, 2024 and have not completed the enrolment process, i.e., completed and returned the Enrolment Acceptance and paid the \$100 Acceptance Fee, please make this a priority. Families who have not completed the process were contacted by either phone or email over the last few weeks requesting prompt action. Places for Reception are filling quickly.

Enrolments for Reception in Term 3, 2024

A review of enrolment applications lodged will be completed in Term 2 this year.

Any families who have not yet completed the enrolment process will be contacted. Please be patient, we will contact you soon if required. Information about Curious Xavier's (CX) will be issued to families who have completed the enrolment process in early Term 3 this year ready for CX to start in Term 1, 2024.

Enrolments for Reception in Term 1, 2025

Any families who have not yet completed the enrolment process will be contacted between late Term 2 and early Term 3 this year. Please be patient, we will contact you soon if you have not been issued with an Acceptance letter or completed the process. Information about Curious Xavier's (CX) will be sent out to families who have completed the enrolment process in early Term 1 next year ready for CX to start in Term 3, 2024.

Overdue/Lost/Damaged books




